

NATIONAL ROAD HISTORY DAY



The **John and Annie Glenn Historic Site** recognizes and honors the lives of the Glens and relates the story of 20th Century America through the prism of their lives. Your group will experience a **unique living history tour** on the main floor of John Glenn's boyhood home and a guided tour of the galleries and other rooms upstairs, including his bedroom. You'll also see a 20-minute award winning movie on the lives of **John & Annie Glenn**.



The **National Road/Zane Grey Museum** is highlighted by a 136' diorama that portrays the road at various periods in history. Exhibits illustrate how vehicle technology prompted improvements in road surfaces. An original **Conestoga wagon** and a fine collection of Ohio Art Pottery are featured. Also included is a tribute to Zanesville Author **Zane Grey**, who is well known for his western novels.

NATIONAL ROAD HISTORY DAY TOUR INFORMATION

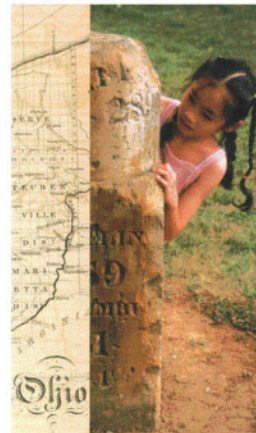
As part of your National Road History Day, your



group will be learning more about the importance of the National Road (the Main Street of America), the first federally funded highway which opened doors to the west. The road travels over

700 miles, starting in Baltimore, Maryland and ending in St. Louis, Illinois.

Your group will have the opportunity to visit a perfect example of one of the unique features of the National Road, a wonderfully restored "S" Bridge on the western edge of New Concord. From this spot they will be able to view the original Zane's Trace, the B&O Railroad, the National Road and Interstate 70. These routes led settlers westward; on foot, in Conestoga wagons, on horseback, in buggies and then later in cars and trucks.



On a 15-minute self-guided ride through Norwich, your group will view the site of the first fatality on the National Road followed by an excellent stretch of brick paved road you may walk or ride on as you proceed on to the National Road/Zane Grey Museum.

Join us for your **National Road History Day**, a great educational experience for groups of all ages. The two museums will work together to develop a schedule to accommodate your group.
